

Bright Lights, Big City



By the 1970's when the Eaton's store was demolished to make way for the CF Toronto Eaton Centre, the Downtown Yonge neighbourhood had become a thriving shopping district, a tradition continued to this day, with over 130 clothing stores, all within a 15-minute walk from each other.

On your travels through the neighbourhood you may also stumble upon other architectural marvels such as the Toronto Hydro's headquarters, opened in 1933; the Maple Leaf Gardens, home to the Toronto Maple Leafs until 1999; College Park, which was the home of the Eaton's College Street store; and the Church of the Holy Trinity, which is the oldest building in the Downtown Yonge neighbourhood, dating back to 1847.

Live music has been part of the heart and soul of Downtown Yonge for decades. Dozens of bars and taverns lined Yonge Street in the 1950's through to the 1970's, where notable jazz musicians thrived such as Dizzy Gillespie, Oscar Peterson, and Muddy Waters.

Music History of Yonge Street

Rock and folk music also flourished in these spaces, bringing Levon and the Hawks (The Band) together with Bob Dylan to create the hard-hitting sound of Dylan's 1974 North American tour, as well as giving the legendary Gordon Lightfoot his start in the music industry. 


Music Murals

Our two 22-storey music murals pay homage to Yonge Street's past music scene. Illustrated by Toronto mural artist Adrian Hayles, these music murals are a stunning visual reminder of the long, vibrant history of music in Downtown Yonge, which continues today. The north facing mural honours the greats of the 50's and 60's like Glenn Gould and Gordon Lightfoot, while the south facing mural pays homage to the stars of the late 60's, 70's and 80's like The Band and David Clayton Thomas.

The performing arts are an integral part of the community, and this mural is dedicated to celebrating the rich past, present and future of this sector in Downtown Yonge.




Alley Jams


If you prefer an in-person experience, check out the Friar's Music Museum, open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week at 279 Yonge Street.





Town Tavern

Toronto's top jazz club during the '50s and '60s featured the music's biggest stars and was where now legendary Canadian jazz pianist Oscar Peterson recorded his acclaimed On the Town album.



Colonial Tavern

It began as a jazz rival to nearby Town Tavern before evolving into a popular venue for blues and, briefly, as a home for punk and new wave music.



Massey Hall

"Canada's Carnegie Hall" is the country's oldest and most acoustically revered venue and over its 126-year-history has featured concerts of every genre imaginable.



Nickelodeon

A legendary watering hole throughout the '70s that featured popular local bands and surprise out-of-town guests like Bob Dylan and Frank Zappa.




Friar's Tavern

Offering everything from jazz and rock to rhythm & blues, this club was the epicentre of the Yonge Street scene and the place where Bob Dylan found his backing band. Location of the current Friar's Music Museum, a free interactive exhibit detailing the sights and sounds of Toronto's music scene.



Brown Derby

From the late '40s to the mid-'70s, the Derby offered music-comedy acts and an eye-catching exterior that helped to make the Yonge & Dundas intersection a famous city landmark.



Piccadilly Tube

Designed to look like an English tube station, this Union Jack-waving underground pub kept aloft the torch for hard rock on Yonge—even during the disco era.



Le Coq d'Or (and the Hawk's Nest)

A massive club on two levels presented the biggest names in rock, pop and soul and served as the main stompin' ground of Rompin' Ronnie Hawkins.



Edison Hotel

The popular hotel featured the top names in jazz, blues, rockabilly and country music until the mid-'70s—then in 2011 arson destroyed the heritage building.



Steele's Tavern

Sandwiched between two giant record stores, this restaurant-bar would have been overshadowed by its neighbours if it hadn't played its own pivotal role in music.



Zanzibar Tavern

Before it became a famous adult entertainment nightclub, this club was a home to some of the hottest jazz and blues on the Yonge Street Strip.




Bluenote

Toronto was a rhythm & blues town in the 1960s and this tiny after-hours club was ground zero—with Motown stars often dropping in to perform impromptu sets.



Eaton Auditorium

The acoustics of this fabled performance hall, on the top floor of a department store, made it Glenn Gould's favourite performance and recording space.



Maple Leaf Gardens

A sports shrine and longtime home of the Toronto Maple Leafs, this iconic building was also the city's largest music venue, featuring the world's biggest superstars.



Club Jamaica

The earliest sounds of ska, rocksteady and reggae in Toronto could be heard in this West Indian nightclub where the legendary Jackie Mittoo once appeared.
